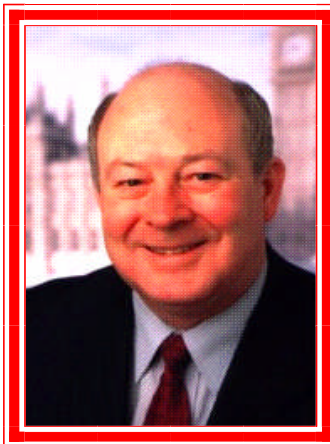

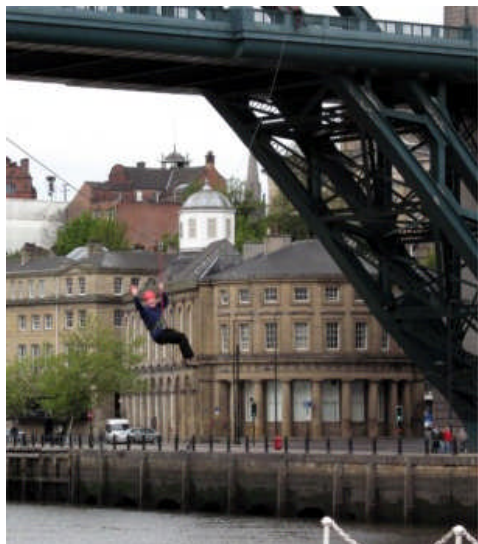

Go for Jobs Travel Ticket Scheme

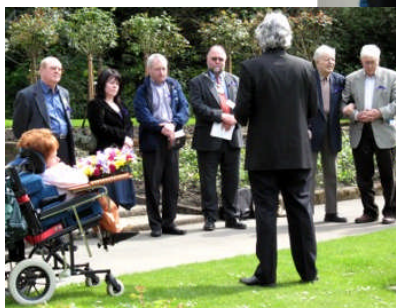

Comment

History will, I think, be kinder to **Tony Blair** than many of his current critics, including many Party members. Elected with almost impossibly high expectations in 1997, I believe he genuinely did what he thought was right and best for his country.

But - as **local elections** showed - he has bequeathed a party at its lowest for 25 years, and the country in a sour mood. I was able to do at least some work in every Gateshead ward during the campaign. It was uphill work - better than last year but the pauses and the hesitation from residents when canvassed are a reminder that politics is as much about atmosphere and mood as policies. And unfortunately, all the improvements over the last 10 years have been banked and forgotten - never mind a strong economy; tax credits that didn't exist pre-1997; NHS waiting lists halved, best ever school results.....

Like an old married couple, voters now just take a Labour Government for granted. Iraq popped up occasionally, but a key theme on the doorstep was the Labour leadership. Voters felt that everything was vague and drifting at the top, and prolonging the vacuum with a 6 week **leadership election process** won't help either.

Having said that - generally - analysis of the voting figures show a slight swing to Labour in Gateshead and a slight decrease in the Lib Dem vote. But, with little evidence of the much-vaunted Tory revival in either Gateshead or the North, there was also the paradox of a decrease in the Labour majority in some wards, where intense and sustained work had taken place over the last 12 months.

Congratulations to all our candidates for good, solid campaigning, and welcome to our new councillors!

4 gains from the Lib Dems in Newcastle were marred by the loss of Newburn and Labour Leader John O'Shea. Call me suspicious but a 60% increase in the Lib Dem Vote with virtually every one of the increased turn-out going to a single party???

So, where now? Gordon Brown, Chancellor for 10 years, has a huge hurdle to overcome - he has to electrify the stale political air with new ideas, inspire a jaded electorate with new directions, and enthuse a new generation of Labour supporters. I think he can.



Parliament

Gordon Brown delivered his eleventh **Budget** in March. Hailed as a Budget for Britain's families, he announced that education spending would rise to its highest ever level, Child Benefit will rise over the next 3 years to £20 per week, and the child element in tax credits will rise by £150 per year. The basic rate of income tax was cut from 22p to 20p from April 2008; adult rate Minimum Wage increased to £5.52 per hour. An increase in pensioners' tax allowance will take 600,000 pensioners out of paying income tax altogether.

Other legislation has included the **Mental Health Bill**, the **Pensions Bill**, the **UK Borders Bill**, **Welfare Reform Bill** and **Concessionary Fares Bill**.

I was able to quiz Sir Rod Eddington when he attended a hearing of the **Transport Select Committee**. His report on the UK's transport infrastructure is disappointing and unambitious. I remain concerned about the absence of a high-speed north/south rail link, the region's inadequate road infrastructure, and the effects that both of these will have on the region's future productivity, stability and

economic growth.

I have spoken in two separate debates on **concessionary travel** and attended a meeting with **Tyne and Wear Fire Authority** as well as meetings about **Bridging Newcastle Gateshead** and the **Northern Way**. I also met with representatives from **S&N Breweries**, and **Passenger Transport Executives**, as well as joining colleagues from both Houses to discuss possible future directions for the campaign for House of Lords' Reform.

In addition to the engagements on the front page, I and fellow Gateshead MP Dave Anderson met with the Leader and Chief Officers from **Gateshead Council**. Following on from concerns raised there, I organised useful meetings with Local Government Minister **Yvette Cooper** and Roads Minister **Stephen Ladyman**.

I also attended the **Association of North East Council's Conference** 'Transport: The Way Forward'.

Without a modern, fast and efficient transport infrastructure, the region will continue to lag behind in terms of economic development. And until we have an equally modern, efficient and affordable public transport system, we cannot reasonably expect to prise people out of their cars by introducing road-pricing schemes.

I also met with officials from the **North East Chamber of Commerce**.

Finally, I am delighted to announce that **Ken Childs** has agreed to act as my agent. Ken combines meticulous accuracy and efficiency with aplomb and will do the job brilliantly, for me and for the Party.
