Comment

So, symbolically at the start of a New Year, we have the opportunity to start a clean sheet with a new constituency. It will be an important year, not only for the fledgling Gateshead Party, but also for the Party nationally.

Our first challenge will be the local elections in May. Last year's elections were virtually conducted under fire from our own side, never mind the opposition! I hope that Ruth Kelly's choice of private sector education for her son is not the beginning of a similar wave of embarrassments for those of us on the ground!

Then, later in the year, we will have **Party leadership and deputy leadership elections**. Inevitably, the press will regurgitate the usual accusations of uncertainty and confusion over policy direction - but hopefully, that will only apply to the Tories!

But the leadership election, even though there might only be one candidate, still offers a forum for all members to debate and discuss the Party's future direction.

I have been greatly encouraged by some of **Gordon Brown**'s recent speeches - not least his speech at the opening of the Trade Union Education Centre - and his hints of a refreshing new approach to Labour in government. The leadership election campaign, even with one candidate, will provide the opportunity to discuss policies that have been ignored or ridiculed in the past few years; the deputy leadership campaigns, with more front runners than the Grand National, most certainly will!

I know that many Party members share my concern that a throwback to patronage and privatisation, top-down management and centralised control won't lead us to victory next time. A new Leader will provide the opportunity to refresh the Party and the Government - we should grab it.



With Christmas and the New Year over, Parliament has resumed work and the programme outlined in the Queen's Speech is well under way. This week saw the remaining stages of the Welfare Reform Bill and the Statistics and Registration Service Bill. Legislation dealt with before the House rose for Christmas included the Second Readings of the Digital Switchover Bill, Offender Management Bill. and the Third Reading of the long-awaited Corporate Manslaughter and Corporate Homicide Bill. This Bill isn't perfect but, with amendments made in committee, it represent a huge step forward and offers an effective way hold companies, if not individuals, to account where negligence results in death.

As always, further details of any Bills presented to the House can be obtained from my office.


The Prime Minister also initiated a debate in the country about Trident by making a Statement on the Government's decision to maintain the UK's independent nuclear deterrent. The world has changed dramatically since Britain acquired a nuclear deterrent half a century ago, and the question has to be asked whether it is wise to keep it in very different times. What good are nuclear weapons against terrorism? On the other hand, can we take the risk of giving them up, at a time when the only certain thing about our world today is the uncertainty?

I was also able to press the Transport Minister in debate on the **dualling of the A1** by emphasising that whilst the scheme was a high priority for the region, there were insufficient funds to do the work.

In addition to the usual Northern Group and PLP meetings, I have met with **Bernard Garner**, the Chief Executive of the transport executive, Nexus. I also met with Defence Minister Derek Twigg to talk about **HMS Calliope**, without much obvious progress on my suggestion to move it down river to purpose-built and designed premises on the former McNulty shipyard. But, I was told, the Navy has no money to effect a move - it's clearly all gone on the millions spent on the refurbishment of the Ministry of Defence.
