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
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UK-Japan 21st century Group

Comment

The barrage of media interest into MP's pay/expenses/allowances continues. Let's not forget the basic point - the system of allowances for a second home and associated running costs was brought in so that ordinary working class people could become Members of Parliament as opposed to the old system whereby MPs were drawn wholly from the moneyed classes who already owned homes in London.

Doubtless the Establishment would rather the working classes learnt their place. Certainly the story at the weekend about the money spent on the refurbishment of the Speaker's accommodation' completely ignored the fact that it wasn't Mr Martin's own property that was being refurbished but 'the Speaker's official Residence' in the Palace of Westminster. The Residence is used for official functions - visits by heads of state for instance - and will be used by Speakers for the next 300 years as it has been for the last 300. But the Establishment cannot stomach that a former sheet metal worker should hold such high office - what was a whispering campaign denigrating his abilities for some years has now become a fullyfledged anti-working class campaign by snooty journalists.

The local government election campaign is now underway. As usual, there will be two peaks - the first when the postal votes go out on 21 April and then a second wave before 1 May. I urge everyone to try to give at least an hour to their ward to help get the leaflets out. I'll do my best to get round as many of Gateshead's wards as I can.

Polls indicate something of a Tory revival, I'll believe it when I see it in the North East. Certainly the Lib Dems are worried - their anticipated revival under the new leadership has failed to happen, despite new leader Nick Clegg's boasting of his sexual

prowess (goodness knows which section of the electorate that was aimed at) but he seems to be earning the soubriquet 'Nick Cleggover'. And a leading Gateshead Lib Dem councillor has a strange way of rewarding Lib Dem local voters- many of whom are in fact Tories - when he described Conservatives as 'vermin' on his website.



Parliament

Party Deputy Leader and Leader of the House Harriet Harman confounded many of her critics at last week's Prime Minister's Question time when she gave a brilliant performance at the despatch box. Deputising for Gordon Brown, Harriet had cleverclogs William Hague tied up in knots and probably wishing he was wearing the flak-jacket that the Daily Mail so criticised her for using as she walked around her constituency days before.

Much of early March saw the continuation of the Debate on the Budget, but legislation included the significant **Local Transport Bill**. I spoke in the debate, saying the Bill is long over-due - the 20 year decline in bus ridership has been matched by 20 years of very healthy profits for the bus companies, as they cherry-pick the most profitable routes and leave many of our communities with poor or non-existent bus services.

The Bill seeks to redress that by allowing transport authorities to package a number of routes, both the profitable and the less so but which provide a lifeline to small communities, and inviting the bus companies to tender for the whole package.

I also welcomed Gateshead College students to the Houses of Parliament, attended a meeting of the **Passenger Transport Authorities Group** and hosted a reception for small retailers, anxious to help the government in its policy of restricting the purchase of certain products by age but equally anxious for their businesses to thrive.

In my capacity as member of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association executive and chair of the Turks and Caicos Group, I also met with the **Turks and Caicos Education Minister**.

Following last year's budget and our discussions here in Gateshead Labour Party I wrote to Treasury ministers pointing out the consequences of abolishing the 10p tax rate for some people on low earnings. I was under the impression that this was being looked into and would be addressed in this budget. Regrettably ministers have been unable to resolve this issue and I have joined those Labour MPs who are insisting this should be revisited.



Constituency

I met with representatives from **Northumbrian Water** to discuss future plans.

The BAE Schools Road Show visited St Joseph's school and I joined representatives and spoke to the children about my own experiences as an engineering apprentice.

Tory shadow chancellor George Osborne was gob-smacked to find me waiting in the lobby of the Hilton Hotel when he arrived for the **Tory Party Spring Conference**. I told him I hoped they spent lots of money here but not to expect too much in the way of a welcome from Tory voters who tend to vote Lib Dem in Gateshead and Newcastle.
